

Computers 4 Kids Donates 128 Computers to Casey County Students



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ConnectKentucky's Computers 4 Kids donates 128 computers to Casey County sixth-graders to encourage technology literacy for the entire family

Liberty, KY: Today, 128 Casey County sixth graders received the news that they will be receiving computers and printers at a press conference held at Walnut Hill Elementary School. The computers were donated through ConnectKentucky's Computers 4 Kids program, an innovative program designed to help close the digital divide among Kentucky's youth. This donation was made possible by a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC).

"We are so fortunate that selected students in Casey County will receive computers and printers through an effort organized by ConnectKentucky," according to Linda Hatter, superintendent of Casey County Schools. "This charitable donation will enhance and enrich the lives of our students for many years to come."

ConnectKentucky was recently awarded a \$300,000 grant by Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) to distribute over 1,000 computers in the ARC region. With the generous support of the Appalachian Regional Commission and in partnership with Lexmark International, ConnectKentucky will be distributing 128 computers paired with a Lexmark Inkjet Printer.

Computers 4 Kids brings together public and private partners to help Kentucky households join the Information Age. The program is the most comprehensive initiative of its kind undertaken by any state in the nation. It ensures that computers donated by the state and private providers will be saved from landfills and used for the benefit of Kentucky families.

Today, thousands of Kentucky children live in homes without computers. Computers 4 Kids is designed to help those children by providing access to technology where the need is greatest. For many families, owning a computer is the first step to reaching the opportunities available through the Internet.

"Computers 4 Kids continues to transform the lives of Kentucky's families," stated Andrew V. McNeill, Vice President of Program Development for ConnectKentucky. "Through the generous contribution of the Appalachian Regional Commission and the support of our corporate partners, ConnectKentucky is closing Kentucky's digital divide, one household at a time."

Placing computers in the hands of underprivileged students awards them the opportunity to access educational and research materials they need in order to effectively compete in today's global economy. Recent research revealed that broadband adoption grew five times faster in

counties that received computers through Computers 4 Kids and its predecessor, No Child Left Offline, in the last two years.

ConnectKentucky has already initiated and executed a successful pilot project of Computers 4 Kids and its predecessor, No Child Left Offline, and has delivered more than 2,000 Internet-ready computers to middle school students and their families in 11 ARC counties. As part of the ARC initiative, ConnectKentucky has already delivered more than 1,000 computers to Powell, Estill, Lee, Elliott, Martin, Bell, Martin, Harlan, and Russell counties.
